I can never enter this time of the year without reflecting on the amazing qualities of President Abraham Lincoln. I had the wonderful experience of attending my first Lincoln Remembered Banquet with our Wichita Brothers in November. "Presidents' Day" will be celebrated in February, but this is the time of Washington and Lincoln, not of men of lesser stuff. Washington shaped and founded our nation in its struggle of separation, legally and politically, from Great Britain. He also consciously set a high example for his elected successors. Lincoln tempered the fine steel of the first revolution and ensured its preservation in fact and spirit. The forge was hot and stoked with the blood of millions of Americans and touched nearly every family, both Union and Confederate.

I have seen recent new programs on television about President Lincoln and about the Reconstruction he desired, as opposed to the Reconstruction that happened. It was aptly characterized as "The North won the War, but the South won the Reconstruction. What changed? It was the absence of Lincoln the Leader and Lincoln the Father. His ability to blend the top political minds of his era into a vital and effective government under his hand as a beneficent dictator during wartime duress (they didn't vote on cabinet policy, they advised) was one of his greatest strengths,

but led to the unexpected succession of the Tennessee Democrat and white supremacist, Andrew Johnson, upon his death. Lincoln had a deep respect for the common soldiers of BOTH sides of the conflict and knew their differences of opinion. He respected each in proportion to his Honest commitment to their country the common country of Washington. This was a unifying factor which became apparent decades later as veterans, both Union and Confederate, often shared campfires and conversation. That is the spirit of Lincoln.

The unique Lincolnesque ability to see and pursue the larger goal, as exemplified by Washington and described by our Constitution with the perspective of history amid the heat of petty politics and short term gain, ensured Father Abraham of his gigantic standing in the history of the American Experiment in democracy through republican government. What if Booth had been faint hearted and drunk while his accomplice shot Johnson, instead of vice versa. How much more suffering would have been alleviated in the ensuing century? How much clearer knowledge and politics of shared experience and goals, opposed to splinter politics and short term solutions. How with the longer vision seem never to see the danger close at hand, but perhaps the see this as slavery of short sightedness.

Let us endeavor to honor our Union ancestors and their Commander in Chief and I hope everyone takes a minute to reflect on "Ol' Abe" and how one vision and then its absence affected these great United States. Perhaps it is even worth a small conversation with someone else. Communication with respect was one of Lincoln's greatest strengths.

Four of his cadets represented the honor guard at the ceremony and these young men elevated the ceremony to a level of professionalism and honor that was far beyond what our camp alone could do. Their program at SMNHS participated in the national drill competition represented by 625 high schools across the nation. Their team was voted number one – what a wonderful achievement, and their performance at the Veterans Day ceremony demonstrated that level of professionalism.
